






Sometimes People Die by Simon Stephenson

The UK's most prolific serial killer, Harold Shipman, was a GP who murdered at least 250 of his patients. Procedures have been tightened since then, but there are few better places for a homicidal doctor to operate than a hospital; as the title of Simon Stephenson's scary new novel reminds us, *Sometimes People Die* in the best of medical establishments. Stephenson trained as a doctor and his book is set in an overstretched hospital in the East End of London where grieving relatives are too much in awe of the doctors to question their loved ones' cause of death. That all changes when a barrister demands an investigation into the sudden demise of her mother. The cause turns out to be a deliberate overdose.

The suggestion that a clever killer could operate in a busy hospital is all too believable and the novel is a riveting read, interspersed with intelligent reflections on what might drive a physician to kill.



The Invisible by Peter Papathanasiou
